The 8th Meet the Experts Conference, will follow the Practice Management Conference, which will be held in Barcelona from 29th Dec – 3 Jan. Members can attend one or both conferences.

This is a great opportunity to see all that is unique about Switzerland- the landscape and climate, the history, culture, way of life, and the food- and at the same time update yourself with the latest in modern medicine. The conference is small and intimate, and there is ample time for discussion and questions. The format will include didactic presentations, interactive workshops, role play, and case presentations.

The conference hotel has been chosen for its modern facilities and high levels of service. It is currently undergoing major renovations and refurbishment. There is an onsite ski shop and rental counter. There is a heated indoor pool, sauna, spa and massage therapist. Social activities will include skiing and snowboarding, local tours, and a rest day with an excursion to a cheese factory at Gruyeres, and a chocolate factory at Broc. You may have heard that Switzerland is a very expensive country. It's a bit like Japan, in the sense that everything is clean and well maintained, and that levels of service are very high. Coffee is a little more expensive than OZ, (and not as good), meals are expensive if you want to eat rump steak or veal, but if you try the local soups, pasta, fish, pork and cheese dishes, it's very reasonable. Ski lift tickets and lessons are bargains compared to OZ. Tipping is not expected, and prices already include tax. So with a bit of caution, a conference and holiday in Switzerland need not break the bank. It's certainly cheaper than the US (and a lot more interesting!)

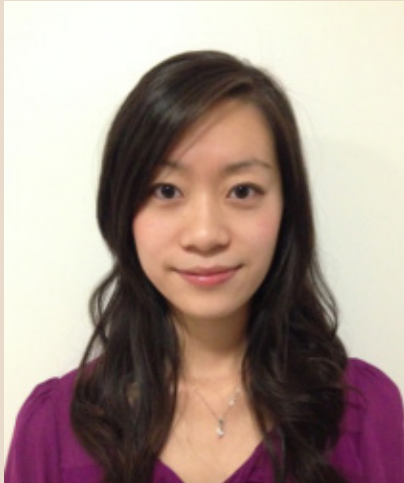

Community Health Subcommittee Media Programs 2016

Chinese Australian Service Society (CASS) – Save Our Hearts Project 2016

- CASS have received funding from the **HEART FOUNDATION NSW** Go Red for Women Community Grant to run a project called "Save our hearts".

- The project aims to raise the awareness of the clinical and life style risk factors and their impact on heart disease, specifically among women in the **CHINESE AND KOREAN** communities and guide them how to keep their heart healthy by providing essential information in a culturally and linguistically appropriate way.

- It is supported by the **ASHFIELD AND STRATHFIELD** councils.

- The main target clients are Chinese and Korean women aged over 30. They have engaged the ACMA in this project.

- Ashfield Town Hall has been booked in the morning of 11, 18 and 25 May 2016 for three information sessions to be conducted in Mandarin, Cantonese and Korean respectively.

- I have advised CASS to engage the Korean Medical Association as well.

HIV Testing Awareness Campaign 2015-2016

- This is a campaign organised by **THE 3BRIDGES COMMUNITY** (3bridges.org.au). It is a not-for-profit organisation that works with communities to build happier, healthier, connected, educated and enriched communities.

- This campaign is targeting the Chinese Australian community, in particular gay male new migrants from China because of a relatively high prevalence of **HIV/AIDS** among this population according to the health statistics in NSW.

- This campaign is in collaboration with the Sydney South Eastern Local Health District, CASS, ACMA, Mission Australia and a few local community organisations.

- They are recruiting '**CULTURAL AMBASSADORS**' to promote the messages in the Chinese Australian community. 18 have been recruited so far.

- I have assisted in writing relevant HIV/AIDS articles in the **CHINESE AUSTRALIAN DAILY WEEKLY MAGAZINE** health column on 19 Dec, 26 Dec, 2 Jan, 9 Jan, 16 Jan, 23 Jan and 30 Jan.

- A major event is planning for either March or April 2016.

Bowel Cancer Awareness & Resource Info Day 2016

- In response to community demands, CanRevive has received \$2000 from ACCF and another \$2,000 from our ACMA Charitable Trust to organise two 1-day education seminars in **CHATSWOOD AND HURSTVILLE**. This community health educational project can attract our Trust's support because the ACMA Charitable Trust has set the priority of funding support for community health education in the Chinese Australian community last year.

- This project was originally named "**MINI CANCER AWARENESS AND RESOURCE EXPO**" (**MINI C.A.R.E.**). The name has recently been changed to "Bowel Cancer Awareness & Resource Info Day".

- The word 'mini' is added in contrast to the C.A.R.E. that the CanRevive and the ACMA organised in 2009 in which more than 1500 participants from the Chinese Australian community had attended at its peak. The Mini C.A.R.E. is only aiming for 150 participants in Chatswood and possibly another 150 in Hurstville.

- Working partners of the Bowel Cancer Awareness & Resource Info Day included: ACMA, Willoughby Council, Cancer Council NSW and Sydney North Heath Network (previously Northern Sydney Medicare Local)

- Some organisations will set up stalls to provide additional information. They included: National Bowel Cancer Screening Unit of Bowel Cancer Australia, North Sydney Multicultural Health Unit and Cancer Council NSW.

- **DR STEPHEN LI AND PROF DANFORN LIM** are involved in the working party.

- The date and time of the event is Saturday 30th April 2016 from 10am to 4 pm.

One of our Management Community members, **DR MICHAEL SUEN**, will be the principal speaker on that day. A GP, invited by Sydney North Heath Network, will talk about screening and a dietitian, Dr Annette Wong, will talk about diet and bowel cancers. The organising committee is still seeking other relevant health professionals to give talks.

PARRAMATTA HEALTH SEMINARS FOR 2016

- This is an award-winning program (**MULTICULTURAL HEALTH AWARD**) organised by the Parramatta Council Library with ACMA as the principal partner. Other partners included the Cancer Council NSW and Western Sydney Local Health District (Auburn Community Health Service).

- Evaluation meeting just before Christmas 2015 revealed very positive feedbacks from the participants (305 responded out of 459)

- Majority of participants were 56 and above with the largest age group being 61-65 (23% participants)

- 52% attendees have previously attended these programs

- Most lived in Parramatta

- 68% attendees were female

- 40% participants heard about the program via email

- 95-100% participants found the venue, dates, timing and duration suitable

- 98-100% participants found the content suitable and met their expectations

- 94% participants were satisfied with resources provided

- 100% PARTICIPANTS SAID THEY WOULD CONTINUE TO ATTEND

- A planning meeting for 2016 was held in early January 2016. The organizing committee is sending out speakers invitations. Some ACMA members and ACMA Management Committee members are among the list of speakers that will be invited to participate.

1. Simply visit facebook.com and enter a few details to sign up (there is also a Chinese option). You will log in to Facebook with the email address you provide.

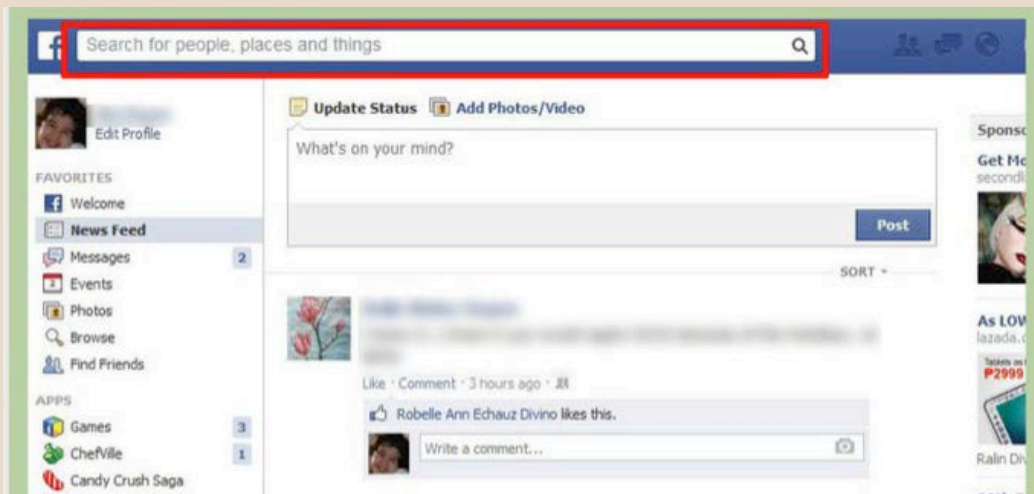
